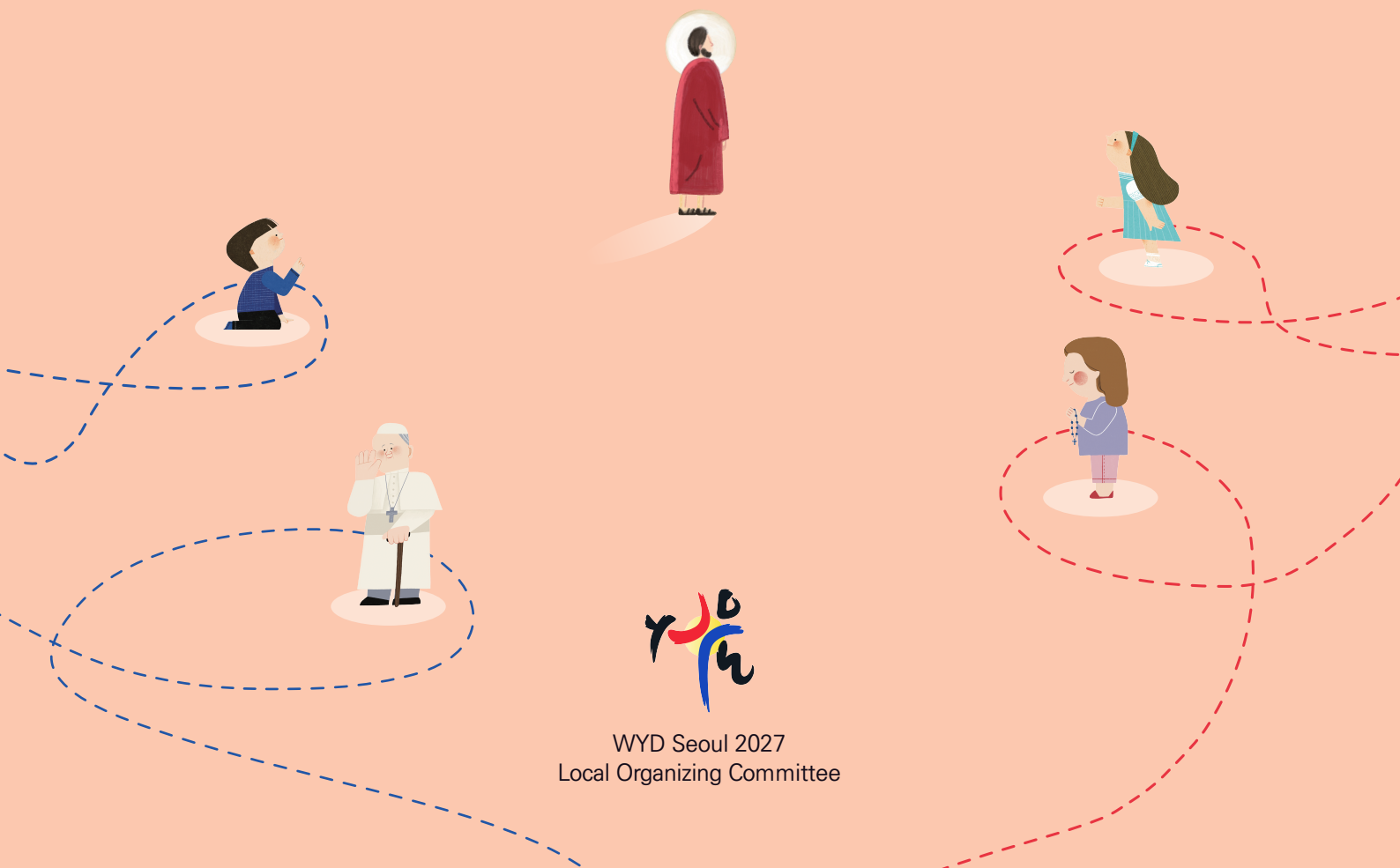

How to Use the *Christus Vivit* Workbook

WYD Seoul 2027 and Youth Ministry



World Youth Day (WYD) is a large-scale international religious and cultural event where the Holy Father invites young people from around the world to embark on a pilgrimage, coming together to celebrate their faith in Christ. When St. John Paul II established World Youth Day in 1985, he encouraged local Churches to develop pastoral initiatives for young people and began issuing an annual message to the youth of the world. In 1986, the first WYD was held, providing a global gathering where young people could reflect on the teachings of Jesus Christ, experience fellowship, and deepen their faith.

At the closing Mass of WYD Lisbon 2023, Pope Francis announced Seoul, South Korea as the host city for World Youth Day in 2027. On September 24, 2024, he proclaimed the theme for WYD Seoul 2027: "Take courage! I have overcome the world" (John 16:33). This verse is linked to the annual World Youth Day messages, which the Pope announces each year on the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe.

39th 2024-2025	Those who hope in the Lord will run and not be weary. (cf. Isaiah 40:31)
40th 2025-2026	You also are my witnesses, because you have been with me. (John 15:27)
41st 2026-2027	Take courage! I have overcome the world. (John 16:33)

The local Churches around the world plan and carry out evangelization activities for young people based on these annual themes from Sacred Scripture. WYD Seoul 2027 will take place within this continuity, as Catholic youth from around the world journey to Korea to meet the Holy Father and experience faith and fellowship together. Thus, WYD is not merely a one-time event commemorating a specific day. It is an ongoing pilgrimage prepared by the Church with young people and for young people. From its very foundation, WYD has been a continuous pastoral journey for the evangelization of young people.

Purpose of the *Christus Vivit* Workbook

This workbook is designed to help young people prepare spiritually for WYD Seoul 2027. WYD is not merely an international or pastoral event – it is an opportunity for young people worldwide to encounter Christ anew and experience deep love in communion with Him. Through WYD, young people will be empowered to joyfully proclaim the Gospel to the world, drawing from their personal experience of fellowship with Christ. To support this pilgrimage, the workbook encourages young people to gather within their dioceses and parishes to listen to the word of God and reflect on the teachings of the Church. By engaging in the reflections and discussions provided, young people will discern the values of the Gospel relevant to their lives today and be inspired to share the Good News through their lives.

Structure of the Workbook

This workbook is designed to guide young people worldwide in their evangelization as they prepare for WYD Seoul 2027. It focuses on reading and reflecting on *Christus Vivit*, the Apostolic Exhortation Pope Francis addressed to young people and all Christians following the Fifteenth Ordinary General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops on “Young People, Faith, and Vocational Discernment”, held at the Vatican in October 2018.

- **Chapters 1–3:** Reflection and discussion on oneself and relationships with others, God, and the Church
- **Chapters 4–8:** Reading and reflecting on *Christus Vivit*, followed by Conversation in the Spirit to deepen the discussion
- **Chapter 9:** Final reflection on the theme of WYD Seoul 2027, discussing how to personally prepare for and joyfully participate in WYD

Core Approach of Each Stage

In shaping the spiritual journey of each chapter, this workbook follows the **Emmaus journey** (*Christus Vivit*, 237) proposed by Pope Francis as a synodal model for encounter. In accordance with this journey, participants will read and reflect on *Christus Vivit* using the following process.



First Stage: Observation

Jesus appeared, walked along the two disciples heading to Emmaus, and asked, “What are you discussing as you walk along?” (Luke 24:17). The two disciples explained to him what had happened in Jerusalem over the past few days. Instead of simply describing the incident, they thoroughly confessed their sorrow, despair, and the mixed feelings they felt about the experience, and Jesus listened carefully to their stories.

In this first stage, we carefully read *Christus Vivit*. This apostolic exhortation contains the teachings of Pope Francis for young people, which are essential for their life and faith and address the challenges they face. First, we read the sections of *Christus Vivit* pointed out in each chapter individually. Then, with the proposed questions, we reflect on our experiences and organize our thoughts. Through this process, we can find the essential issues in each of our experiences.

The observation stage is the time when we intently observe the joys and “the hopes, the griefs and the anxieties” (*Gaudium et Spes*, 1) of our lives and share them with Jesus. This stage is a crucial step in freeing ourselves from the worldly distractions, biases, and prejudices that unconsciously influence us. Furthermore, it’s a necessary step so we can examine our experiences and interpret our lives in the light of the Gospel.



Second Stage: Attentive Listening and Discernment

After listening to the story of the two disciples, Jesus helped them to interpret their experience under the light of Scripture. Similarly, the stage of attentive listening and discernment is the time to open our hearts to the Holy Spirit and attentively listen to how others interpret their experiences through the light of the Gospel.

This is done in small groups of 5-6 young people, following the **conversation in the Spirit** method. This helps us personally encounter the living God, value others as His precious creations, and build a synodal church where we are united within God. The steps are as follows:

1. Share the faith and life experiences you discovered while reading the section of *Christus Vivit*. You can also reflect on and share the answers to the questions found in the chapter.

2. While meditating on what the others shared, listen carefully to the voice of the Holy Spirit with three to five minutes of silent prayer.

3. Share the new discoveries that emerged during your active listening to the other participants. This is a time to experience and share how God is present and active within you.

4. After everyone has shared, listen carefully to the voice of the Holy Spirit again with three to five minutes of silent prayer.

5. After silent prayer, discern how to apply the insights gained to change your life, based on what was shared in step three. Discern the insights through the lens of the Gospel and then consider how to realistically apply them to your life. You can also use the questions in each chapter to help identify values and concrete ways to put your ideas into practice. By discovering the key points in this shared journey, you're helping build a unified community.



Third Stage: Unity

As the two disciples of Emmaus came closer to the village, they urged Jesus, saying, "Stay with us, for it is nearly evening and the day is almost over" (Luke 24:29). Jesus accepted the invitation and stayed with them to share a meal. Jesus took bread, said the blessing, and as he gave it to the disciples, their "eyes were opened" (Luke 24:31) and they finally recognized Jesus. Just as the disciples' minds and hearts were opened when they met the resurrected Jesus, we can only fully understand how to live as a Christian and gain the power and courage to do so when we become one with the living Jesus Christ in the Holy Eucharist.

As such, **the stage of unity is above all a time when the whole community becomes one with the living Christ in the Eucharist.** Thus, we highly recommend sharing your thoughts before Mass and becoming one with the Lord through the Eucharist afterward. After receiving Communion, give thanks for what you discovered in the meeting and pray for the strength and courage to put it into practice in real life. If it's not possible to attend Mass after the meeting, have a short period of Eucharistic Adoration or say the Prayer of Unity in the Eucharist to unite with the living Christ present in the Holy Eucharist.

Fourth Stage: Mission

The disciples on the road to Emmaus were devastated by the death of Jesus and were returning home, back to their old lives. However, their encounter with the risen Christ changed everything. Their experience compelled them to turn back (“repent”) to Jerusalem, the place where they had known Jesus. Despite the risk of persecution as followers of Jesus, they overcame their fear, “set out at once” (Luke 24:33), and returned to Jerusalem, where they shared the good news of their experience with the other disciples.

Similarly, young people who are united with Christ in the Holy Spirit and understand the Gospel’s true value will **return to their own lives, ready to live out their faith with joy**. To aid in this, at the end of each chapter there is a short Church teaching to deepen our understanding of the themes explored in *Christus Vivit*. It is also the time to put into practice the personal and community missions identified earlier. That’s why the final stage is the mission.

Each stage of the Emmaus journey is an opportunity to experience Christ’s love, as revealed in *Christus Vivit*, and to grow in faith. This journey will empower young people preparing for WYD Seoul 2027 to become courageous missionaries, transforming the world through their faith.

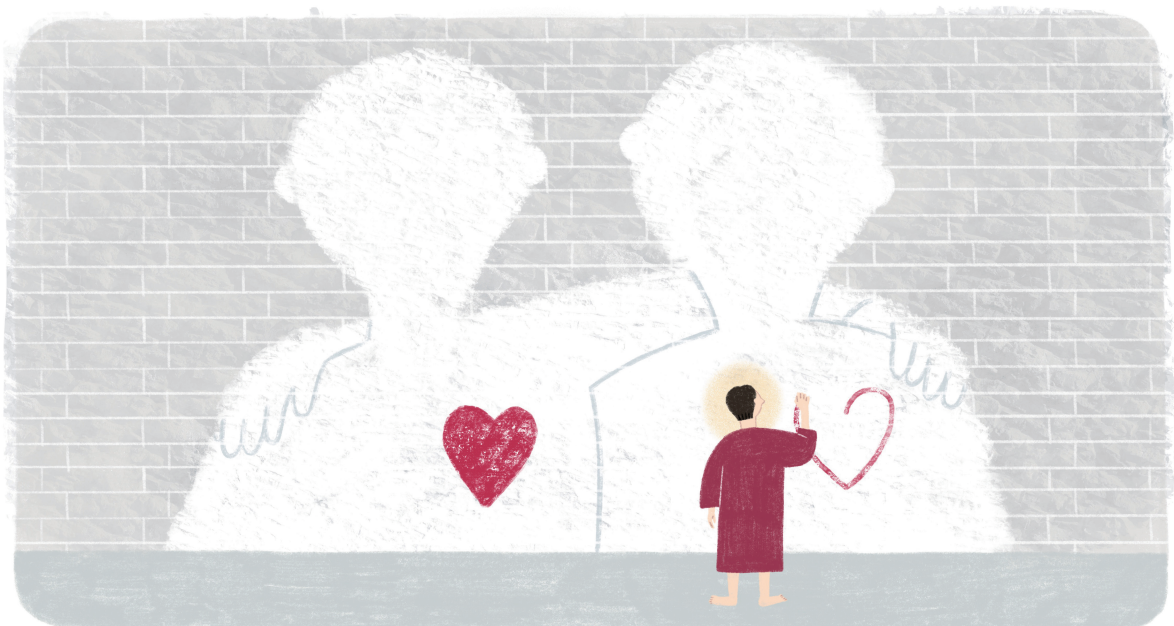

In both East and West, we may trace a journey which has led humanity down the centuries to meet and engage truth more and more deeply. It is a journey which has unfolded – as it must – within the horizon of personal self-consciousness: the more human beings know reality and the world, the more they know themselves in their uniqueness, with the question of the meaning of things and of their very existence becoming ever more pressing. This is why all that is the object of our knowledge becomes a part of our life. The admonition “Know yourself” was carved on the temple portal at Delphi, as testimony to a basic truth to be adopted as a minimal norm by those who seek to set themselves apart from the rest of creation as “human beings”, that is as those who “know themselves”.

Moreover, a cursory glance at ancient history shows clearly how in different parts of the world, with their different cultures, there arise at the same time the fundamental questions which pervade human life: “Who am I? Where have I come from and where am I going? Why is there evil? What is there after this life?” These are the questions which we find in the sacred writings of Israel, as also in the Veda and the Avesta; we find them in the writings of Confucius and Lao-Tze, and in the preaching of Tirthankara and Buddha; they appear in the poetry of Homer and in the tragedies of Euripides and Sophocles, as they do in the philosophical writings of Plato and Aristotle. They are questions which have their common source in the quest for meaning which has always compelled the human heart. In fact, the answer given to these questions decides the direction which people seek to give to their lives.

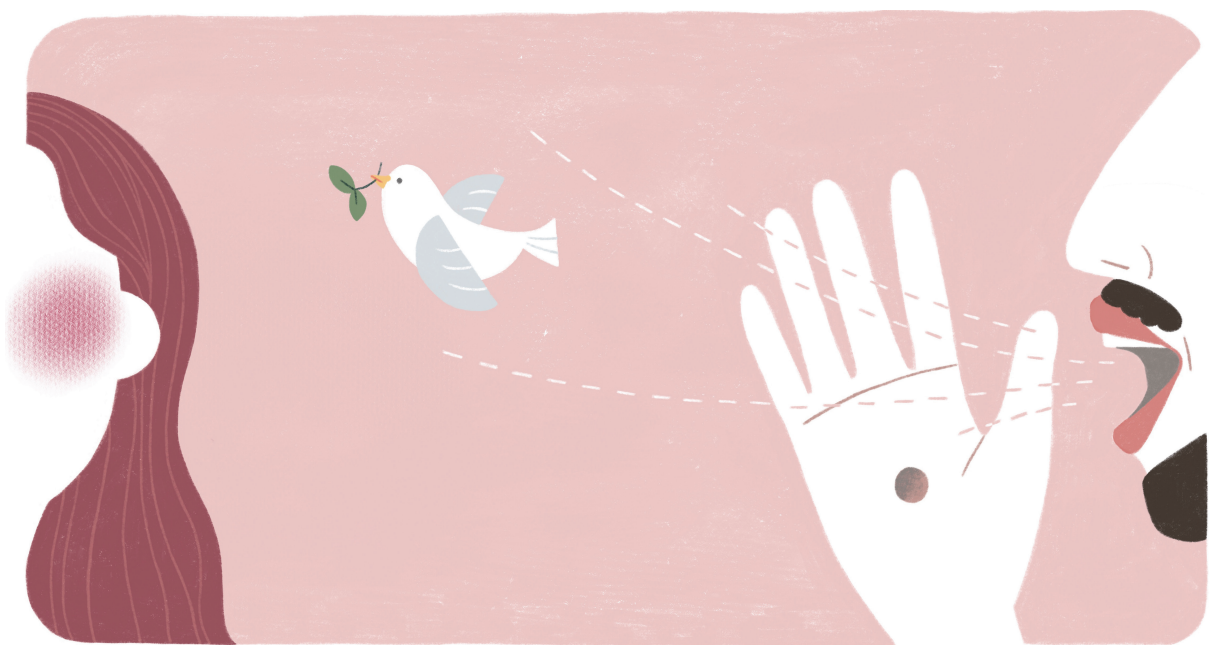

Let's Read

Carefully read the passage, stopping and reflecting if any phrase touches your heart. Write down your thoughts on the passage below.

The Gospel passage recounts for us the remarkable experience of Jesus and Peter during a stormy night on the Sea of Galilee (cf. Matthew 14:22-33). After the multiplication of the loaves, which had astonished the crowds, Jesus told his disciples to get into the boat and precede him to the other shore, while he took leave of the people. The image of the disciples crossing the lake can evoke our own life's journey. Indeed, the boat of our lives slowly advances, restlessly looking for a safe haven and preparing to face the perils and promises of the sea, yet at the same time trusting that the helmsman will ultimately keep us on the right course. At times, though, the boat can drift off course, misled by mirages, not the lighthouse that leads it home, and be tossed by the tempests of difficulty, doubt and fear.

Something similar takes place in the hearts of those who, called to follow the Teacher of Nazareth, have to undertake a crossing and abandon their own security to become the Lord's disciples. The risk involved is real: the night falls, the headwinds howl, the boat is tossed by the waves, and fear of failure, of not being up to the call, can threaten to overwhelm them.

The Gospel, however, tells us that in the midst of this challenging journey we are not alone. Like the first ray of dawn in the heart of the night, the Lord comes walking on the troubled waters to join the disciples; he invites Peter to come to him on the waves, saves him when he sees him sinking and, once in the boat, makes the winds die down. [...]

Every vocation is born of that gaze of love with which the Lord came to meet us, perhaps even at a time when our boat was being battered by the storm. Vocation, more than our own choice, is a response to the Lord's unmerited call. We will succeed in discovering and embracing our vocation once we open our hearts in gratitude and perceive the passage of God in our lives.

On the Road: Me, You, and the Lord

There are certain questions we ought to ask. We should not start with wondering where we could make more money, or achieve greater recognition and social status. Nor even by asking what kind of work would be most pleasing to us. If we are not to go astray, we need a different starting point.

We need to ask: Do I know myself, quite apart from my illusions and emotions? Do I know what brings joy or sorrow to my heart? What are my strengths and weaknesses? These questions immediately give rise to others: How can I serve people better and prove most helpful to our world and to the Church? What is my real place in this world? What can I offer to society?

In thinking of my own youth, I realize that stability and security are not the questions that most occupy the minds of young people. True enough, it is important to have a job and thus to have firm ground beneath our feet, yet the years of our youth are also a time when we are seeking to get the most out of life. When I think back on that time, I remember above all that we were not willing to settle for a conventional middle-class life. We wanted something great, something new. We wanted to discover life itself, in all its grandeur and beauty. [...]


So we wanted to break out into the open, to experience the whole range of human possibilities. I think that, to some extent, this urge to break out of the ordinary is present in every generation. Part of being young is desiring something beyond everyday life and a secure job, a yearning for something really truly greater. [...]

Saint Augustine was right when he said “our hearts are restless till they find their rest in you.” The desire for a more meaningful life is a sign that God created us and that we bear his “imprint”. God is life, and that is why every creature reaches out towards life. Because human beings are made in the image of God, we do this in a unique and special way. We reach out for love, joy and peace. So we can see how absurd it is to think that we can truly live by removing God from the picture! [...]

In some parts of the world, particularly in the West, today’s culture tends to exclude God, and to consider faith a purely private issue with no relevance for the life of society. Even though the set of values underpinning society comes from the Gospel – values like the sense of the dignity of the person, of solidarity, of work and of the family –, we see a certain “eclipse of God” taking place, a kind of amnesia which, albeit not an outright rejection of Christianity, is nonetheless a denial of the treasure of our faith, a denial that could lead to the loss of our deepest identity.

For this reason, dear friends, I encourage you to strengthen your faith in God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ. You are the future of society and of the Church! As the Apostle Paul wrote to the Christians of Colossae, it is vital to have roots, a solid foundation!

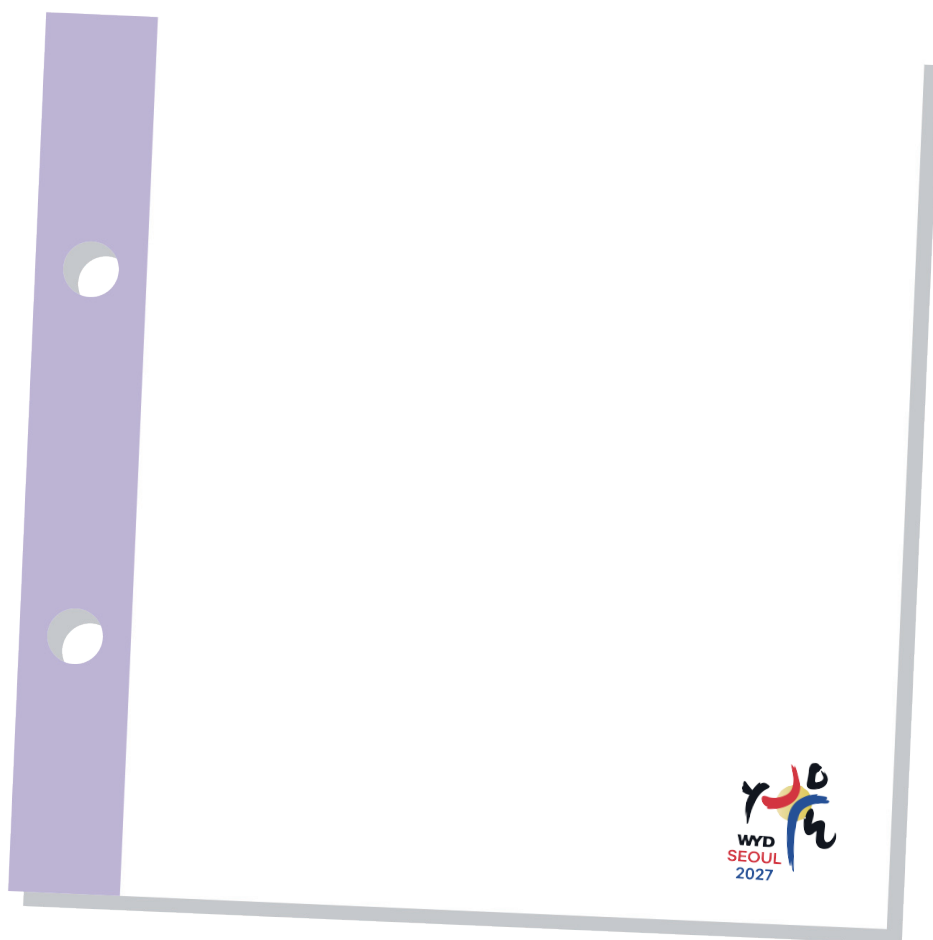

Not some fleeting pleasure, a momentary satisfaction that, once experienced, keeps us longing for more, in a desperate quest that leaves our hearts unsated and increasingly empty. We aspire to a happiness that is definitively found in the one thing that can bring us fulfillment, which is love.

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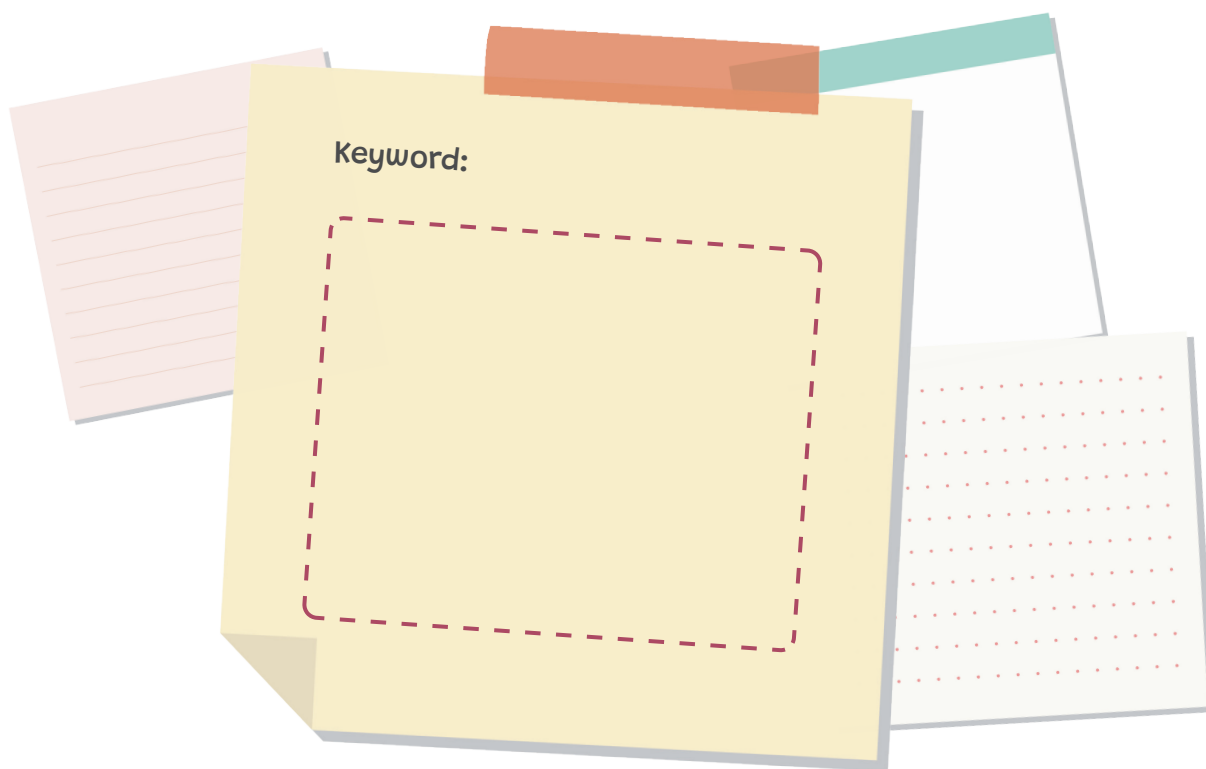

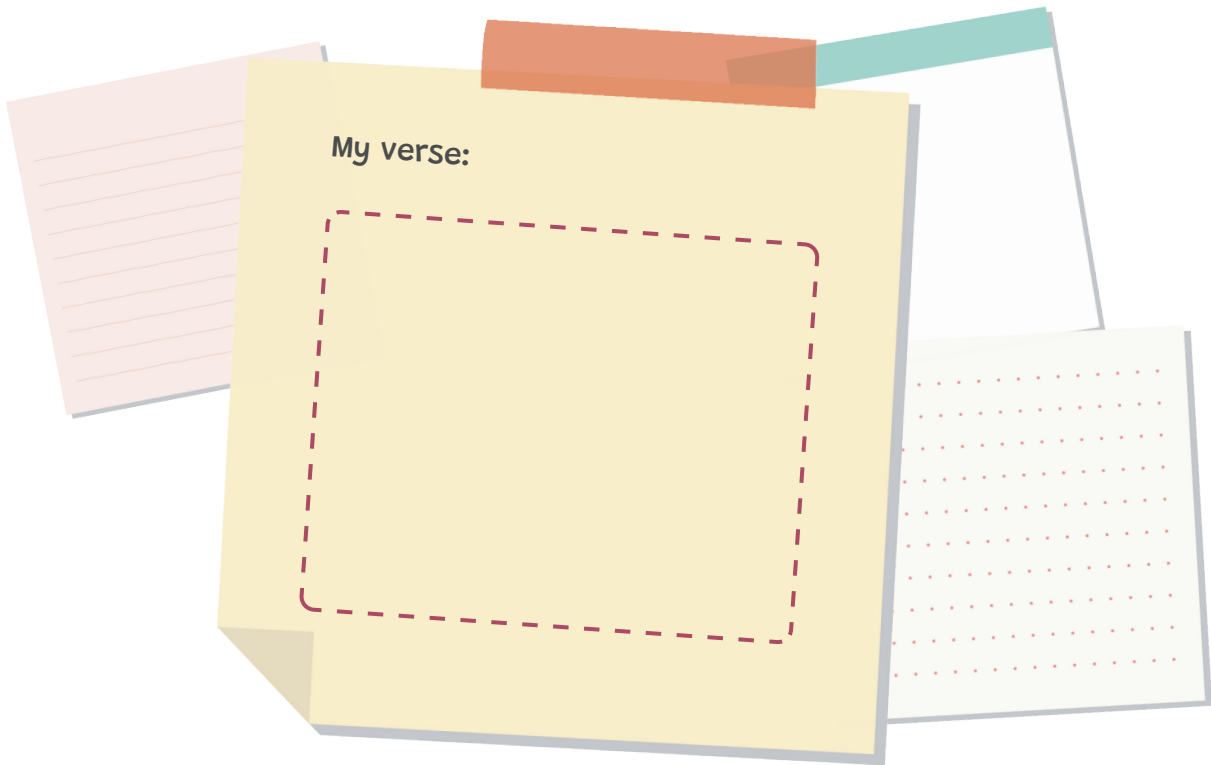

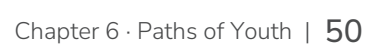

The Story of Pope Francis and His Grandma Rosa

Pope Francis has often spoken of the wisdom of the elderly, especially grandparents, and the “great mission” they have in passing on the faith, emphasizing that their witness and practice of the faith through their lives is of the utmost importance. This idea of the Holy Father is also expressed in the pamphlet “You Have a Great Mission” (Avete un compito grande) by Aldo Maria Valli. In this work, Pope Francis beautifully describes how his grandmother Rosa taught him the faith when he was a child. It reads as follows:

I was blessed to grow up in a family that practiced faith in a simple and concrete way. Above all, it was my father’s mother, my grandmother, who showed me the path of faith. [...] Every Good Friday evening, my grandmother always took us to a candle-light procession. The procession culminated with the recumbent Jesus. My grandmother, when she arrived in front of Jesus, knelt down with us and whispered to us: “Jesus died, but tomorrow He will rise again!” It was from this woman, my grandmother, that I first heard the proclamation of the Good News of the Gospel! How beautiful it was! To hear the first proclamation at home, with my family! And it makes me think of the love of many mothers and grandmothers who pass on the faith. It is they who show us the faith.

[...] It was my grandmother, Rosa, who taught me to pray. She taught me the faith. She also told me about the lives of the saints. When I was thirteen months old, my little brother was born, and my mother was unable to care for two young children. So my grandmother, who lived a few steps away, would pick me up in the morning and take me back home in the evening.

When I confessed my desire to enter the seminary, my grandmother said: “If God calls you, that is very good, but do not forget that this home is always open. If you change your mind, no one will blame you.”

Another saying of Grandma Rosa, which the Pope relayed, is: When I was in the seminary, my grandmother told me: “If you become a priest, do not forget that the most important thing is to celebrate Mass. And she often told us, as children, There are no pockets in a shroud.”

In his breviary, Pope Francis still has the testament that Grandma Rosa wrote to her grandchildren: “May my grandchildren, to whom I have given the best of my heart, have a long and happy life. But if there are days of pain or illness, or if the loss of a loved one fills them with despair, may they remember that if they look to Mary, who sighs in the tabernacle where the greatest and most noble martyr is buried and stands at the foot of the Cross, it is as a drop of balsam on even the deepest and most painful wounds.”

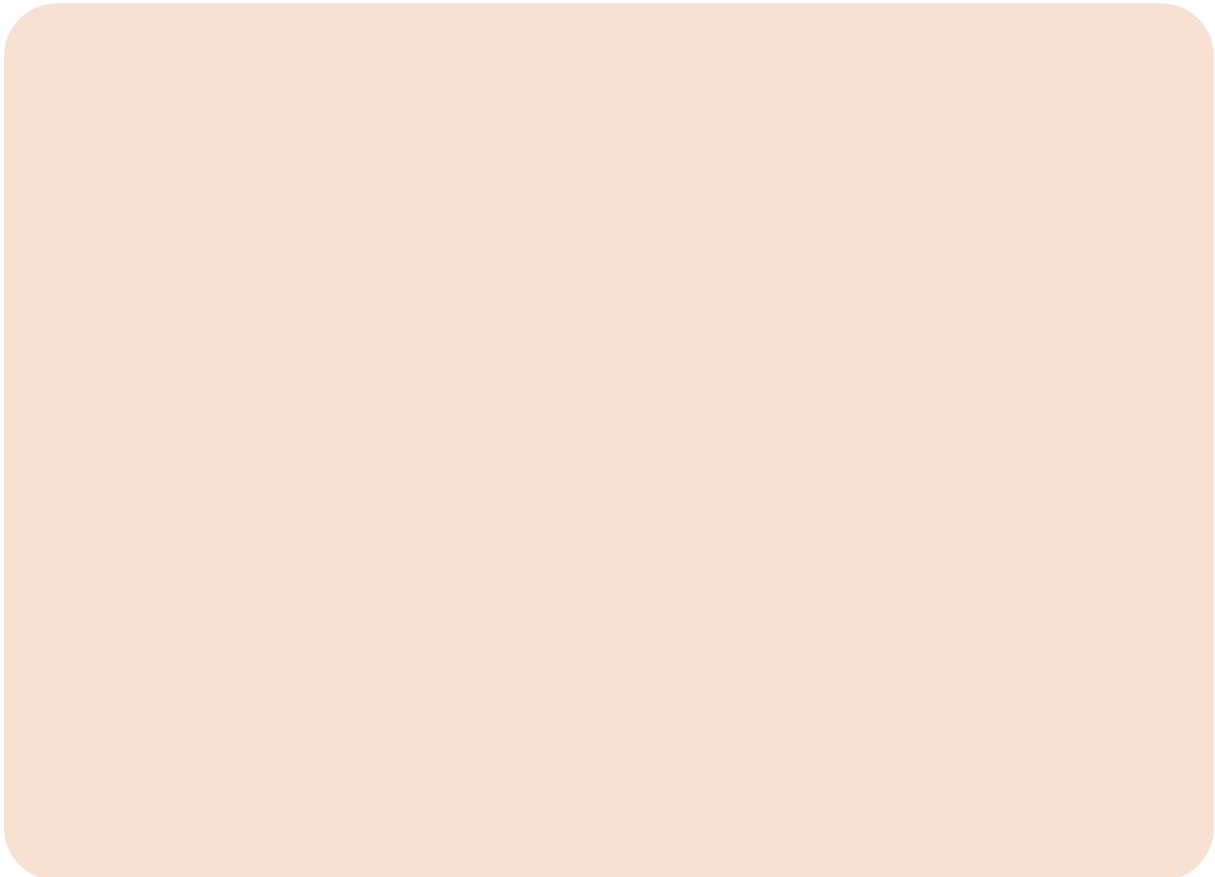
